The Five I's of Stakeholder Involvement

Identify stakeholders
Invite them to participate
Inform them of the issue
Involve them in the process
Improve the process





Identify Stakeholders

Examples

- Law enforcement
- Public health
- Highway safety
- State and local DOT
- Emergency response
- Boards of Education
- Advocacy/community
- Tribal leaders

Ideas

- Scan the landscape
- Individuals with safety jobs
- Key community leaders
- Non-traditional partners
- Personal interest



Invite Stakeholders

- ➢ Face-to-face meetings
- Email invitation
- Follow up phone call
- ➤ Strategies

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- Provide information on your purpose
- Make it personal
- Demonstrate what is in it for them
- Identify responsibilities up front



Inform Stakeholders

- > Keep group size manageable
- Select meeting date and time in advance
- >Send out agenda and materials early
- Give people ownership
- > Make meetings interesting and informative
- > Use newsletters, web sites
- Identify resource and information needs
- Celebrate victories



Involve Stakeholders

- Develop interactive structure
- Provide opportunities for feedback and input
- Identify spokespersons





Improve the Process

Scenario #1

- County engineer
- ➢ Road diet project
- Help from stakeholders
- Obstacles
 - Opposition from influential people
 - Meetings dominated by a few speakers
 - Lack of access to data and information





Scenario #2

- Develop local (county) road safety plan
- Need input and feedback from stakeholders
- Obstacles
 - Key individuals are stretched thin
 - State DOT District not too supportive
 - Do not know how to access data
